OUR GOLF TEAM WINS PRINCE ARTHUR CUP

Our Golf Team - Alec Murray, John Robson, Robin Philpott and Ian Kimmins achieved a memorable victory in this year's Prince Arthur Cup held at Walton Heath on 15th May. Two years previously the team had finished at such a lowly level that no place had been guaranteed for the 1996 competition.

The Pipe Makers team was first off at 8.00 am accompanied by a friendly Stationers Company team - many times winners. Our first pair of Alec Murray and Ian Kimmins experienced a shaky start but inspired by some fine tee shots by the former, they soon began to produce much steadier golf. The points began to mount and just behind them John Robson and Robin Philpott were producing the goods. In the event Alec Murray and his partner produced the best score of the morning. At lunchtime the team captain sniffed victory in the air and had to be calmed by his team mates and restrained from indulging in too much Club Claret!

The afternoon round was less successful than the morning's round but, in the event, good enough to win the Competition. Having been first off there was an agonisingly long

wait for the result to be declared but the Pipe Makers team produced the only plus score of the day (Plus 1) with the runners up being the Worshipful Company of Bakers, having a score of Minus 1. 56 Livery Companies were represented. On being presented with the Cup, Alec Murray thanked the organisers and said that he and his fellow team mates had been spurred on by the Pipe Makers Bridge Team which had won the Inter Livery Bridge Competition with some regularity. "We felt it was our time to do something".

So how was it all done. Was it those words in the first newsletter "Your correspondent has not checked the position but has a sneaking feeling that over the years the Company has always been 27th or thereabouts". Or was it the fact that the team actually practised together a fortnight or so prior to the Competition when, as your correspondent recollects, there was a non too serious discussion about tactics and at the end of a pleasant afternoon's golf a small amount of money changed hands?

In addition to the magnificent Prince Arthur Cup which was on display at the Installation Lunch the team also won the sweep of £360.00 and which was donated to the Benevolent Fund Trustees.

PAST MASTER ROGER MERTON REFLECTS ON HIS YEAR

University, to a Buckingham Palace Garden Party, to the Election of The Lord Mayor, to the United Guilds Service, to the visit to Ironbridge and the Broseley Pipe Works, to the annual visitation to Sevenoaks School to interview our Scholars, to the annual Livery Companies Visit to the Black Country Museum. All in all an action packed year. My waistline has suffered, but so be it!

It would be invidious to single out any one person to thank in particular, but I thank you all for allowing me, hopefully, to continue to uphold the Company's good name. I have been proud to have been your Master and I wish my successor an equally enjoyable year.

BENEVOLENT FUND

In our first Issue the Chairman of the Benevolent Fund Trustees, John Solomon, gave a general summary of the Fund's activities. He now talks a little more about the Sevenoaks Scene ...

The Benevolent Fund's principal charity is Sevenoaks School where we have 19 scholars. Tommy Cookson took over as Headmaster last September. He and his wife, Carol, came to the school from Southampton where he had been Headmaster of King Edward VI school.

Tommy was educated at Winchester College and Balliol College, Oxford.

He teaches English Literature and Latin and has taught at Winchester, Hopkins Grammar School in Newhaven, Connecticut and Manchester Grammar School. Carol was brought up in Sri Lanka and has worked for the United Nations in New York before joining the Foreign Office and going to Kuala Lumpur. They have 3 daughters, two at University and one at Sevenoaks. Tommy's particular interests are the theatre (he has produced plays - and even films!) and most sports, especially golf and the Governors would be well advised to check attendance duringany his of the golf classics.

The school has some 940 pupils, about a third are boarders and there are almost as many girls as boys. Our scholars range from 13 to 18 years of age and currently comprise 10 girls and 9 boys. The school unusually has intakes at three different ages - 13, 15 and 17. The latter are more usually from overseas and attend one of the two international houses, where scholars tend to take the International Baccalaureate which is a speciality of the school. Many of our scholars are in addition gifted athletically and we have a girl who has represented England Under 18s at show

England Under 17s at skiing and lother girl is doing very well in the tennis world. Yet another girl came 2nd (amongst both sexes) in shooting at Bisley. The two senior Pipe Maker scholars are Eva-Mona Gotz (18) from Germany who received prizes in History, French and German (a rare achievement) and David Tabah Vertoont from Las Palmas, who will shortly read Biology at Oxford.

OUR NEW HONORARY CHAPLAIN


When you go into St Botolph's Aldgate, our Chaplain's church, there is a surprising whiff of soap powder as if you had strayed into a supermarket. But you are not wrong, since the gallery of the church acts as a warehouse for thousands of grocery items that have been given to the church to help in their great project of feeding and sheltering the homeless in the City and the East End.

Brian Lee, our Chaplain, masterminds this enterprise with a full time staff of fifty volunteers and a budget of £1.3 million which he raises partially through Government funding, but mostly through donations of money and goods, which he calls "harvests", reaped from the various donor organisations. Between 200/300 people are fed from the Crypt every night and in addition there are five associated hostels in the East End.

Brian has been Rector of St Botolph's since 1993 having established a reputation in his previous ministry for caring for the homeless. Interestingly he started adult life as a mathematics teacher after studying in York but he was drawn towards the church and went on to study Divinity at Kings College London before being ordained by Bishop Mervyn Stockwood in 1979.

He is also Chairman of the Governors of the Sir John Cass Foundation primary school, the only State School in the City, and to which our Benevolent Fund has just donated £500.

Born in Cheshire in 1951 Brian is a collector of antique clocks, a keen walker and traveller, and as all of us who know him have found, delighted to be associated with our Livery Company.
